I am an assistant professor in the Division of Physical Therapy in the Emory University School of Medicine. I have secondary appointments in the Wallace H. Coulter Department of Biomedical Engineering, a joint Emory/Georgia Tech department and the Parker H. Petit Institute for Bioengineering and Bioscience at Georgia Tech. I am keenly interested in understanding and harnessing the plastic capacity of the human nervous system in health and disease to improve rehabilitation outcomes for individuals with neurologic injury and disease. Previously, I received my bachelor's degree in physiology and doctor of physical therapy degree both from the University of Minnesota. After finishing my PhD training in rehabilitation science and neuroscience at the University of Minnesota, I competed my postdoctoral research training in the Brain Behaviour Laboratory at the University of British Columbia. I joined the Division of Physical Therapy at Emory in 2014. My previous clinical experience centers on rehabilitation from acute neurologic insult and major multiple trauma. I currently direct the Neural Plasticity Research Lab at Emory. My research team utilizes multimodal neuroimaging and neurostimulation techniques to characterize and modulate brain activity to promote the recovery of function following neurologic insult.
