- Poor teamwork
- Lack of leadership to improve health-system performance & provide central coordination
- Reluctance to serve marginalized communities
- Narrow focus w/o broader context
- Personal agendas, professional turf & competition
- Time, resources, academic schedules
- Cost of education/student debt
- Unprepared faculty
- · Clinician and faculty burnout
